

Over 200 guests enjoyed bacon and eggs prepared by the Mallala & Districts Lions Club, before celebrating our new Australia Day Citizen of the Year 2023 Award winners and welcoming our community's newest citizens. Celebrations ended with an impromptu chorus of the National Anthem from the audience.

Mayor Mark Wasley introduced our Australia Day Ambassador, Alison Mackinnon AM, who spoke about the emerging role of women in Australia's history. A former Foundation Director of the Hawke Research Institute, Alison remains as an Emeritus Professor within the University. A Fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia and the convener of the SA branch of the Academy, she was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in 2009. In 2014 she was appointed to the Heritage Council of South Australia.

The Daniele's have both given their time and unconditional commitment to the Two Wells community for over 45 years. Mr Daniele was an Adelaide Plains Councillor for 47 years, retiring from the position in 2022, and Mrs Daniele is a long-standing Two Wells Red Cross volunteer. Together they are actively involved in many community projects including tree planting, lobbying for a primary school, and served as committee members on numerous local community and educational groups. Mr Daniele has spent many hours supervising the construction of St Joseph's Catholic Church and building the Two Wells Community Centre.

Young Citizen of the Year Jamie Humphrys

Excelling as a student at Xavier College Gawler, Jamie was House Captain in Year 12 and completed high school with the title of Dux in Science and Maths. Graduating from university in 2021 with a Bachelor of Teaching and Computer Science, Jamie is now not only the Assistant Coach for the Two Wells Football Club Under 14's, and a keen tennis player, but an inspirational teacher focusing on the holistic development and growth of his students.



Community Event of the Year Mallala Monument Centenary Celebrations



The Mallala Monument ensures the names of fallen soldiers are not forgotten by future generations, and celebrated its centenary in 2022. Over 220 community members attended the formal service on Sunday 16 October 2022. The celebratory event was a joint collaboration between the Adelaide Plains Historical Society, Mallala Lions Club, Mallala Primary School and Mallala RSL, assisted by Council staff.





Community Project of the Year Dublin Cemetery Shelter

The late Bob Thompson commenced restoration and upgrades of the historic Dublin Cemetery in 1998 by clearing the land, researching unmarked graves and planting numerous salt bushes. In 2011 Sid Fielder offered to complete Bob Thompson's project by restoring the Cemetery's gates, and planned to construct a new shelter. Unfortunately passing away before the project was completed, the Dublin Community Projects Committee completed the new shelter, adding historical plaques, with fundraising and support from the Dublin community. The new shelter was officially dedicated on 25 September 2022.

We welcomed 9 residents as newly conferred Australian citizens, each gifted with a native sapling to mark the beginning of their new journey.



COMMUNITY AND CIVIC HUB INVESTIGATION

We are working with you, our community, to create a strategic vision for the region's community facilities of the future – facilities that meet the needs and aspirations of a growing community for years to come. Being one of the fastest growing local government areas in South Australia brings a change in expectations of how we deliver services, what facilities we provide, and how we accommodate more residents, visitors, and staff.

Mallala and Two Wells have a proud history and strong community, with several historical Council buildings. However, our population is soon to outgrow these, and our facilities are aging. As time passes it becomes more costly to ensure they provide adequate access to Council services, meet compliance, and provide enough administrative workspace.

Our investigation into a strategic vision for our future facilities begins with the sharing of ideas and feedback. We have engaged an independent consultant, Holmes Dyer, to review our current community and civic facilities, and provide the sufficient information for Council to make an informed decision about what our future facilities could look like. This project is not a commitment to proceed with any particular facility, building, or service.

What we want to know:

The information and feedback gathered through this project will help to establish a vision, guiding principles, and the community and civic facilities and services that need to be considered. These are all important to understand before Council makes any decisions about our future facilities.

Holmes Dyer will be asking what you love about Council's current community and civic facilities, what you want or need in the future, and what is important to you.

What happens after?

Information will be shared with Council, and available on our website. The information we learn now will inform the next phase of planning for the future. There will be many more opportunities to provide your ideas and feedback as our research and planning progresses.

Two Wells Walking Cycling Plan

Walking and cycling benefit our wellbeing, local economy, and the environment.

Hart Reserve

Just a short walk or bike ride down Petticoat Lane from the Two Wells main street is Hart Reserve – a place we are transforming into a vibrant space for future generations.

The design for Hart Reserve considers innovation, flexible use, safety, accessibility, functionality, and environmental requirements. Previous community feedback requested Council investigates a Skate Park or BMX Track within the Reserve (or elsewhere).

We are working with the awardwinning skate park and youth space design agency Convic to develop this concept further. The thoughts and ideas of our community, especially our youth, are vital to ensure our open spaces provide a relevant recreational space for young people.

Convic will manage the consultation process for the Skate Park and BMX Track with our support and guidance. Your input will guide Convic with their design elements. More information about the consultation will be published on Council's website and in local newspapers closer to winter.

You can view the Hart Reserve Master Plan on Council's website. We will provide another opportunity for community feedback when the design reaches 90% completion.

2022 Community SURVEY RESULTS

We value our community, its needs, and priorities. To ensure we are providing appropriate services to meet our region's present and future needs, we periodically conduct community surveys.

Results can help us understand what services are working well, what we need to improve, and what we might need to consider for the future.

How did we do it?

300 households across our region were surveyed between June and July 2022, with a sample representative of our region's age and gender in the ABS 2016 Census statistics. People completed surveys on the phone, in face-to-face interviews, and online. You can read more about the methodology in the full report on our website.

Feedback from the survey helps us to track the delivery of our 2020-2024 Strategic Plan, and guide our service planning priorities.

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Results from our 2022 Community Survey:



41% of our residents have lived in the region for 20 years or more.



Most important social and environmental issues: Flood prevention infrastructure (rivers and coastal), health services, employment/local jobs, township growth and rejuvenation.



Our community prefers to be informed by: Email (38%), letter/letterbox drops (23%), Communicator newsletter (18%) and social media (15%).



Top areas of satisfaction: Courtesy and politeness of customer service, way contact was handled, ovals and sporting facilities, car parking, libraries, playgrounds.



Our community's priorities: Roads, waste collection/recycling, stormwater drainage, development assessment.



Over 1 in 5 residents (23%) are satisfied with Council overall. (In 2018 this was 20%)

Being a RESPONSIBLE DOG OWNER ALONG OUR COAST

Our coast is extremely important for many species of shorebirds, plants, and environmental conservation. 45 bird species that feed, roost, or breed in this region are threatened species. To protect the conservation of migratory shorebirds and their habitat, dogs are expected to be on-leash at all times.

The coastline within the Adelaide Plains Council region is a Wetland of National Importance. This includes coastal settlements with around 550 residents and many visitors at Parham, Webb Beach, Thompson Beach and Middle Beach. The Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary National Park -Winaityinaityi Pangkara (AIBSNP-WP) also forms part of the Wetland of National Importance. Under Council's By-laws, our wetland areas require dogs to be walked on a leash no more than two metres in length.

National Parks and Wildlife Service SA advise that dogs are welcome for a walk in AIBSNP-WP provided:

- Dogs are on a lead no more than two metres in length and kept under control
- You (and your canine friend) stick to designated walking trails
- You bring disposable bags to clean up your dog faeces (please be aware there are no bins in the AIBSNP-WP)

Migratory shorebirds are susceptible to disturbance during their roosting and foraging periods. Prolonged disturbance can compromise their capacity to build the energy they need for migration to places far away, such as Siberia and Alaska.

Off-leash dogs are at greater risk of snake bites, catching parasites from wildlife, or eating poison baits laid for vermin control. Having a dog off-leash also exposes their owners to the risk of fines.



Dogs on leash means our coastline, from Middle Beach to Parham, is managed responsibly to support shorebirds and conservation.

> Dogs on private property in coastal settlements and rural areas need to be responsibly managed and can be off-leash.

COUNCIL'S DOGS BY-LAW 2019

An expiation fee of up to \$210 applies.

Our *Dogs By-law 2019* (By-law) requires dogs to be kept on a leash no longer than 2 metres in length at all times in:

- Any Council land that has signs marking a dogs-on-leash area;
- Parks when organised sport is being played;
- Within 5 metres of, or in, an enclosed playground and;
- Any wetland or coastal area (including parks, roads, and verges).

Unwind on the Samphire Coast PARHAM CAMPGROUND re-opens!

Nestled in the northern section of the Adelaide International Bird Sanctuary – Winaityinaityi Pangkara sits the quiet Parham Campground. With only a short stroll across the sand dune to reach the ocean's edge, it is the perfect location to unwind and soak in the scenery, or enjoy a weekend raking for blue swimmer crabs.

The Campground, originally operated solely by Adelaide Plains Council, reopened on 2 April 2023 and is now operated by the Mallala & Districts Lions Club who are supported by Parham & District Action Group.

With a \$100,000 Federal Government grant under the Building Better Regions Fund, and a further \$100,000 commitment by Council, the site now boasts a modern toilet block, coin-operated hot-water shower, RV dump point and a new BBQ shelter and picnic facilities.

The effort to complete the project and reopen to visitors has been a great cooperation between both the community and the Council, after a delay due to incorrect mapping data that was relied upon by Council staff, surveyors, the Department for Environment and Water and the Department for Infrastructure and Transport. Mr Brenton Bell, President of the Mallala & Districts Lion Club, announced the campground "received over 90 bookings before opening day and quickly booked out for the Easter long weekend," at the Opening Celebration held on Saturday 1 April 2023.

TWO WELLS MAIN STREET **Current Projects**

Undergrounding of power Due for completion the end of 2023

Works to underground the powerlines along the Main Street are currently in progress. Overhead power lines, stobie poles and other associated infrastructure will be moved underground, and new LED street lighting will be installed.

The Main Street Masterplan presented an option to construct a central median strip to improve traffic and pedestrian safety, install less infrastructure on the footpaths, and increase vegetation. Following community feedback, Council decided at its 27 March 2023 Council Meeting that at this time, a median strip will not be constructed.

Roundabout Due for completion September 2023
